

Exposure Trends During the COVID-19 Pandemic

The following data compares poison exposures reported to the Washington Poison Center during the first 118 days of 2020 (January 1—April 27) to the first 118 days of 2019 (January 1—April 28).






*"Misuse" is defined as inappropriate use; "Intentional" is defined as suicidal

intent or abuse ("wanting to get high")


Case Volume by Day**

2019: From 1/18 to 3/12, the WAPC managed 1,182 requests for information about measles for the Department of Health (DOH) 2020: From 1/23 to 3/11, the WAPC managed 2,913 requests for information about COVID-19; 2,673 were for the DOH hotline



Total suspected suicide cases (from all substances) increased 10% from 2019 to 2020.

87% of patients exposed to hand sanitizer, household cleaning products, bleach, & rubbing alcohol were managed at home by WAPC specialists. Keeping patients out of the emergency department saved \$2,689,500 patient dollars.
